CHURCH LETTER

From Diana Nicholson, Reader, St Patrick's, Bampton

It is still early May as I write this, but it will be June before you read it and, all being well, we shall once again be able to invite people into our homes, pay family visits and enjoy meals out together. We have all been longing to be able to go where we like, visit who we like, even hug those dear to us.

As we begin to return to normality I have not only been thinking of all the suffering, sorrow and anxiety caused by the pandemic in the UK and throughout the world, but I have also been hoping that some good things may come out of this dreadful time.

In the churches of our benefice there is the great sadness caused by the death of Ian Elliott, one of the retired clergy who ministered to us, and whom we all loved and respected. That is the dark side. Our churches have only just reopened after the lockdown during which time services have been on Zoom, sometimes streamed live from one of the churches. Not everyone has been willing or able to join in these but those of us who have taken part have found a new closeness to members of other churches, a chance to be inspired by some of the life stories they have to tell and the opportunity for very different types of service. That is a positive outcome of Covid-19.

Out in the wider world the best and worst of human nature has been seen. Some have profiteered from the sale of PPE, some have refused to wear masks and have even tried to spread the virus, governments have refused to follow the best scientific advice, domestic violence has increased, and poor countries still struggle to obtain the vaccines they need. And we have all been made very conscious of the inequalities in our own society, poor housing, many families who have to rely on foodbanks, the many people who have not been able to isolate, even where their work conditions are not safe, because without a job they could not pay their rent or feed their children.

But this pandemic has also shown us the good side of humanity in the

dedicated work of doctors, nurses and other health workers in the NHS, in the work of care staff both in our care homes and among individuals, in the kindness of neighbours, in the large numbers volunteering to help organize vaccination centres, in Captain Tom's walk and all who gave so generously to support what he was doing, in the generous response of people who, getting a free vaccine themselves have given money so that people in other countries can also be vaccinated.

And another thing we have seen in recent weeks is that we are not powerless, that we can help to alter things. The outcry from ordinary fans caused the Super League to founder before it started. Without the Black Lives Matter movement would justice have been done in the case of George Floyd's murder? If we don't forget the lessons which this pandemic has taught us, if we all continue to speak up about the crisis in social care, about the building of houses which really are affordable, about the low level of benefits and the difficulties in applying for them, about the abuse on social media then perhaps the "new normal" will be better than the "old normal". But we don't only need to speak; if we can afford it we also need to act, to have a little less ourselves, to be willing to pay more taxes, to give more generously to charity.

Many of you who read this will not be churchgoers; you may, justifiably, be critical of the church, but I am sure that the Christian message of forgiveness and love for your neighbour is one you believe in. Jesus fed, healed and, forgave people and taught his followers to do the same. This is what we all, whether we call ourselves Christians or not, strive to do. But Jesus also taught that God loves each one of us and that he would send his Holy Spirit to give us strength to cope with all the difficulties and sorrows which we face in life and to bring us comfort and joy. And, for Christians, that is something that we have found to be true.

I am pleased to have the opportunity to write this article, having had a spell in Lancaster Hospital, but now starting to recover each day and getting back to doing the things I enjoy. I thank everyone for their care and concern – it was very much appreciated.

I am sure that many like myself will be delighted that Covid-19 restrictions are slowly being lifted so that life can start to return to normal, with shops, pubs, and our churches opening again – still with some restrictions; going to church and not being able to sing, meeting family and friends but no handshakes or hug: it's been hard, but I'm sure better times are coming, when community life can once again restart fully.

The thought of rain being forecast was a delight, but it turned out not to favour gardeners – the rain was heavy with a mix of snow and hail!

I was looking out last evening watching the beautiful cloud formations coming over Shap Fell. I could see the snow and hail showers streaming down, like sun rays running along the fell tops. I questioned, was it March or May? Nature has the upper hand, but we hope for a better summer when we can enjoy the sunshine and longer days, and when we can get our plants established in our gardens.

Covid Vaccinations update

We are no longer giving first vaccines here at the Surgery. We have now attempted to contact all patients who are due their second vaccines. If anyone feels they may have been missed then they need to contact us urgently.

The following information is on our website:

COVID vaccination certification

We are unable to issue this certificate at the practice. Please see the <u>Gov.uk website</u> for further information.

Proof of your vaccination status will be available on the **NHS app**, which is also valuable for accessing your health records and ordering repeat prescriptions.

Alternatively, you can call the NHS helpline on 119 and ask for a letter to be posted to you. This must be at least 5 days after you've completed your course of the vaccine, the letter may to take up to 5 days to reach you.

Shingles vaccination

Patients become eligible for routine vaccination against shingles when they become 70 years of age and all those aged up to and including 79 years are now eligible to receive the vaccine until they become 80 years of age. Individuals who were eligible for the Shingles vaccination programme who turned 80 years during the COVID-19 pandemic and missed the opportunity to be vaccinated, either due to lockdown or because they were shielding at home and unable to attend their general practice, can continue to be vaccinated up to 31st July 2021.

Sadly it is not possible at the moment to book a face to face doctor's appointment at Orton surgery. The doctors and nurses are continuing to operate a "telephone first" system at Shap Medical Practice. It is also possible to have a video consultation if you wish.

If a face to face consultation is needed, it will be arranged for you on the same day at Shap surgery. Some telephone and video appointments can be pre-booked online, otherwise contact the surgery at 8.30am to arrange one. Surgery attendance for appointments will be kept to a minimum to reduce the risk of infection to our patients.

Please check the NHS 111 website if you are unwell with cough, fever or change in sense of smell or taste symptoms.

MEDICATION

Prescriptions will be available for collection from the Orton Village Hall between 10am and 11am on TUESDAYS. Any not collected will be returned to Shap.

If you have difficulty collecting your prescriptions please let us know. We can arrange delivery or refer to the 'Good Sam' Service for help.

Many people, both locally and much further afield, were deeply sorry to hear of the sudden death from Covid -19 of our dear and respected friend, lan Elliott. This page is dedicated to some of the many tributes that have been paid.

From the words spoken by lan's eldest son, Michael:

Dad's achievements were always without fanfare, he would support anybody who needed help, never seeking recognition or favour for his work. He was a man who was always prepared to help those in their darkest hours. He was always there for anyone whether a vagrant or viscount.

The parents of Tim Parry whose life was cruelly cut short by the Warrington bombings wrote to me saying:

"Your father was a truly special man, whom Wendy and I liked and admired greatly... a very gentle man, softly spoken and always kind and courteous to everyone around him. He welcomed all into his church, regardless of their faith (or lack of faith), with open arms and a smile and often, a sandwich or two!! I will always remember Ian with genuine affection and deep gratitude for his support through what was a truly awful period in our lives after losing Tim. He helped give us strength when we needed it most.

You can be proud of your Dad... a genuinely 'good' man and Minister."

From his daughter, Louise:

"A lovely man... The kindest of gentlemen... A truly wonderful man ... A genuine and kindhearted man... Patient and generous... Thoughtful and loving... Gentle and wise ... A beautiful man with a wicked sense of humour and a glint in his eyes... He dedicated his life to helping people..." These are the words that I've heard and read repeatedly since Dad passed away. Yet they're unsurprising as they're words I've heard my whole life—ones I would use myself, when I look at the man Dad was. But he was my DBD—Dearly Beloved Daddy—I will miss you so much.

I've even got a feel for it now, after years of going to new parishes and making sure that they knew that *this* vicar's wife *wasn't* the one to do the church flowers! Walking into the sitting room each day has given me a real lift as the fragrance fills the room.

Your generosity has been wonderful too – with gifts still coming in. You may be assured that it will be put to very good use and lan would be delighted!

These are very early days and planning the service with Louise and the family was, for me, the most important thing to do. I was so proud of all my family and the part they played. The service was everything we hoped for. The Duke of Edinburgh Award

After the articles in the May issue of **The Link** by two local young people, about their experiences with the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, another local resident who took part a

good many years earlier has sent us this account.

Felicity Lawler (née Kershaw)

After becoming a Queen's Guide at 16 years old, I was encouraged by my District Commissioner to join the D of E award scheme.

I had four years to gain the gold award and I achieved this through the Girl Guides, an Outward Bound course and my nurse training.

On 20th July 1969, I arose early to watch the first moon landing and then took the train from Manchester to London to receive my certificate at Buckingham Palace. I was impressed by the Prince's well-worn but highly polished shoes. In our group, he spoke to a young man who was an apprentice at the Barrow-in-Furness shipyard. Up till then, it had never occurred to me that anyone could do the D of E outside Guides and Scouts.

Sometime later, I mentioned to an aunt that I hadn't found the D of E too difficult. Her response was that I had shown 'stickabilty'. I think that 'stickability' and resilience to whatever life throws at you is a legacy of the D of E award scheme, particularly when undertaking the expedition sections of the award.



I now live on a remote hill farm in Cumbria and I keep sheep. I can no longer walk the long distance of a day's hike, but I still love to read any map.

We D of E award holders must be a modest bunch as I do not know of any fellow award holders within my circle. The award scheme develops skills for life, and that is what we do—get on with life.

Brett Whiteley's 'Lavender Bay'

You are probably not familiar with his name, but Brett Whiteley is one of Australia's most admired painters. Our lecturer for May was Paul Chapman, an Art Historian and a National Gallery Trained Guide and although for most of his audience this artist was unknown, Paul brought him alive for us. Outside Australia not many people have heard of him, but at home he is a household name. In the 1970s and 80s he and his wife Wendy were the rock stars of the Sydney art world. They were both artists and studied at the Sydney School of Art, where in 1959 Brett won a scholarship to Europe. Wendy joined him, and they married and a daughter was born in London. They spent 1967-69 in New York and returned to Australia in 1970 via Fiji, from the photograph, having embraced the hippy culture while they were away! Whiteley rented a house at Lavender Bay on the north side of Sydney harbour and established himself as an artist, and it was here that he created a body of work that is now regarded as his best. In 1974 he bought the house, added a tower and enlarged the balcony to embrace the stunning views of Sydney Harbourside and the bay.

Whiteley was influenced by Henri Matisse, and painted huge pictures in oil and mixed media, soaked in intense, vibrant colours. He painted harbour landscapes, interiors and still lifes, often showing an Eastern influence and reflecting romantic ideas of man and nature, and sometimes the difficulties of his own personal story. From his orange series 'Big Orange' is a huge canvas 2.5 x 3m. A view from his balcony, the canvas was covered in sensuous shades of burnt orange, layer upon layer used to reflect deep sunset colours. Whiteley played with abstracted forms to indicate white sails in the bay, a jetty and palm trees by the harbour, very sparely painted to allow the heat of the colour to burn through. He captured the harbour at all times of the day,



and in 'Harbour in the Rain' (1976), again from the balcony, he was attempting to place us in his viewpoint. He used canvas with a Perspex layer 7mm above to enhance the effect of the raindrops painted on it, just showing the ghostly bridge in the background, a truly atmospheric grey day.

'Jacaranda Tree' (208 x 456cm) features as one of his blue series. Here we have his strong shades of ultramarine layered with tones of black in some areas, like the best summer sky you could imagine. The harbour and Lavender Bay steeped in this blue, with little dashes of white parakeets, tails leaving flight-lines behind them, and splashes of white sails in the blue, blue water. His most famous work from this period is 'The Balcony', a wide vista just showing curves of the Opera House and Harbour Bridge to the sides, and curved outlines of the white balcony where we stand and the jacaranda tree seen from above. Your senses become absorbed in the heat, sunshine and again the wonderful blue of this hot summer sky. This ultramarine blue is now commonly known as Brett's blue, or Whiteley's blue, in Australia.



Next we were shown 'My Armchair' (206.5 x 283.5m, 1976). The background a lighter blue, but still ultramarine, and muted orange through two windows in his studio. Again clearly inspired by Matisse, 'The Armchair' or 'Henri's Armchair', more saturated colour with only outlines to delineate articles in the room, probably inspired by Matisse's 'The window in Tangiers'. Matisse said: "What I dream of is an art balance, of purity and serenity.....an art which might be something could be like a good armchair which provides relaxation from physical fatigue."

In the mid-1970s Whiteley was tremendously popular and was winning all the Australian art awards. In 1978 he won the Self-Portrait prize for his triptych, A Photo of the Artist, representing the life of the title. The triptych consisted of a large drawing of the artist, the head rather in the style of Francis Bacon; a baboon screaming in agony, this emotional image referring to Picasso's 'Guernica'; and a small picture of Whiteley's emotional image, almost a cry for help, possibly related to his use of drugs and included an actual syringe glued to the canvas. This caused an uproar. Whiteley died in 1992, thought to be from an accidental drug overdose. After his death Wendy took up 'guerrilla gardening', appropriating a piece of unused ground down by the shore – Wendy's Secret Garden. In time she was allowed to buy this piece of land, having worked on it for many years.

This was an excellent lecture, sadly our last until September as we now take a summer break. We hope by then to be able to return to meeting at Appleby Market Hall, for further information nearer the time please contact <u>artsoc.appleby@gmail.com</u>

RAVENSTONEDALE PARISH HISTORY GROUP

The ingenious and sophisticated story of dry stone walls

The last Spring Zoom lecture, presented by Ravenstonedale Parish History Group was attended by around 50 members and guests, including members of the Upper Eden History Society and attendees of the first Cumbria Blue Badge Guide course to be held in the County for 10 years. The subject that drew in this broad audience was Maurice Hall's talk on Dry Stone Walls.

Familiar across our Westmorland landscape, Maurice presented on the history of dry stone walls the different types and functions of them, and shared personal anecdotes from his childhood working alongside his Uncle learning the ingenious and sophisticated craft of dry stone wall construction.

Featuring illustrations including photographs from Maurice's collection, the talk commenced with an overview of history, drawing upon a number of references including 'Dry Stone Walls, History and Heritage' published in 2016 by the renowned historian, Angus Winchester, Emeritus Professor at Lancaster University. Professor Winchester's book is a brief and heavily illustrated introduction to the history of dry stone walls in Britain, with particular focus on northern England. For those interested in more information, Maurice recommended the book which draws on published works as well as hitherto unpublished primary research and provides an historical survey of the evolution of dry stone walls and a field guide to 'reading' walls themselves as historical documents.

The historical introduction took the audience to Peru, where Machu Picchu, the 15th Century Inca Citadel was constructed with polished dry stone walls. The journey continued to Canada, Iceland, Zimbabwe and then back to UK shores including Wales, Cornwall and Yorkshire. Eight thousand kilometres of dry stone walls are reported to be in the Yorkshire Dales National Park (YDNP), and notably this estimate is prior to the addition of the Westmorland Dales into YDNP, so that figure will be much increased. Although most walls (and the many Barns built similarly without mortar) were constructed after the 15th Century, as a consequence of the acts of enclosure, Maurice shared evidence of Romano-British (after AD43) dry stone field boundaries and other pictorial records of ancient walls.

A wide range of terms and definitions were confirmed, For example there are 1.5 tonnes of stone per metre of wall. The wall builders described themselves as Stone Masons. The role that Walls played in separating the hillside grazing land from the cultivated improved land was presented in a number of dramatic landscape photographs including an explanation of the difference between the head dyke and the ring garth. A head dyke is a dry stone wall which encloses a crofting township, separating it from the common grazing. (shared grazing) or another township. The ring garth separated the in bye land (land close to the farm) and fell side, which prevented animals from trampling and eating the crops.

Photographs also illustrated the differences between professionally planned or surveyed walls, such as the tall straight walls that were constructed for the Lords of Manors, compared to those built by tenant farmers. Maurice presented the 'A' shape of dry stone walls and the components of their construction including through stones, caps or top stones and the use of graded tiers of stones (graded by size). During discussion an audience member contributed the interesting detail, that the walls constructed as boundaries for the deer park (such as on the Lonsdale Estates in Westmorland) did not have through stones as these would have been used by deer to climb the walls and escape the hunting enclosure.

The talk was followed by an extensive discussion, with questions for Maurice and contributions from other members of the audience with knowledge and recollection to add to the understanding of the majority who attended who were novices in their study of dry stone walls. A number of audience members have confirmed that their walks now include looking for the landscape clues of head dykes and ring garths.

As spring and summer draws the local historians outside for entertainment, Zooms and (as was fervently expressed by the attendees) the resumption of 'live' meetings will now resume in the Autumn. RPHG will be collaborating with the Westmorland Dales Partnership on historical walks around Ravenstonedale/
