

CHURCH LETTER

From the Revd. Ian Elliott

A friend of mine recently finished reading "First Confession" by Chris Patten (last British Governor of Hong Kong, now Chancellor of Oxford University) in which he explores the question of identity through the rich and varied stages of his political career. In the final chapter Lord Patten writes this:

"Now, if I wake at night and have chest pains, I first reach for the indigestion tablets. When they work I know that my 'appointment' [by which he means death] is not yet due. It worries me but I don't panic. I suppose this is partly because of my lifetime's comfort blanket. As a Christian I believe in an after-life...it has been my solace from childhood to old age. So, though not at all Welsh, I sing with gusto:

**When I tread the verge of Jordan,
bid my anxious fears subside.**

**Death of death and hell's
destruction**

land me safe on Canaan's side.

And this is part of my identity – a fundamental part – which does make me, and others who believe the same thing, different. We believe in the Christian promise, that life is not the end of the story. So we all die – a universally shared experience – but not everyone thinks: 'That's it then.'"

As one of those 'others who believe the same thing', I find myself pondering that image of Christian faith as a comfort blanket with slightly mixed feelings. Part of me fears that it represents typical British understatement – carried to its extreme. The fact that every last one of us is invited to experience a real, personal, loving relationship with the living God, creator and sustainer of everything that exists, is a mind-blowing concept – and certainly far, far more than simply a sort of blanket to pull round ourselves and

find some comfort in when the world around us seems dark and threatening.



Many Christians, I suspect, would be happier with the picture of walking through life (with all its difficulties, threats and disappointments) hand in hand with a loving Father who knows the future in a way that we can never do, and who has promised always to be there for us whatever life may throw at us.

The bottom line, of course, is that, whatever way of picturing the Christian life may speak most clearly to us, that life is above all for **living**, not just thinking about! When life is tough and so much that we think of as 'normal' has been stripped away, we need deliberately to wrap ourselves ever more tightly in the all-encompassing love of God. When the future seems filled with uncertainty and we find ourselves longing for some clear guidelines and a solid hope to carry us through the storm, we need the faith to reach out and grasp the hand of our heavenly Father, so that we may walk with him through this turbulent life – and beyond it into a glory beyond our wildest dreams.

A VIEW FROM TEBAY

As I sit at my desk looking out on this very cold winter's morning with hard frost, how good it is to feel the warmth of the sunshine on my face coming through the window. The weather has been very changeable in the last few weeks, heavy rain and flooding in some areas, then snow, frost and fog making a beautiful landscape; trees and grasses sparkling in the sunshine.

It's good to see the first signs of spring - bright yellow Aconites, Snowdrops, and lambs dancing around in the fields; all these things starting to bring a bit of brightness in the present situation of Covid 19 lockdown. Whatever the situation, nature's life cycle continues.

Covid 19 seems to have encircled our area this time, with a good number of people being affected, several unfortunately having to spend time in hospital. Our normal routine of life is at the moment on hold, but we are looking forward to better times to come.

My Father used to say "There is always someone worse off than me!" This came about because he had an accident at the age of eleven playing football at the old school, Tebay. The lads played football in those days wearing clogs, and unfortunately he got kicked and broke his thigh, He spent eighteen months in the Kendal old Hospital - two Christmases and two birthdays! And when he came out of Hospital he had a permanent stiff leg and a built up shoe. But the lads in the next beds... one lost one leg and the other both legs! My father often counted his blessings and said "THERE IS ALWAYS SOMEONE WORSE THAN ME!"

How this was brought home to me this week when a very good friend rang and told me his wife had been diagnosed with a brain tumour - this is the news no one wants to hear.

Finally I think most people are awaiting the lockdown restrictions to be lifted, and then hopefully we can again rebuild our communities; organizations can restart bringing people together, looking forward to sharing a cup of coffee with our neighbours and friends, being able to shake hands or give someone a hug, go shopping, share a pint with a friend in the pub, Church re-opening and being able to sing again.

All these things have been missing from our lives over the past months. But there is some light at the end of this tunnel with many now getting their vaccinations. It will be wonderful to share again in community life.

I trust that until then you will take care and stay safe!

Covid vaccine

We advise patients NOT to phone the Surgery unless they are aged 65 or over and have **not** been contacted yet. We have also been inundated with phone calls from patients asking to be "moved up a group". We are working within JCVI guidance and cannot move people ahead of others unless there is a genuine medical reason such as commencing chemotherapy or they missed their age group appointment.

We are not a designated site for delivery of vaccines – we have to travel to Penrith to collect the Astra Zeneca vaccine so that we can hold clinics here at Kirkby Stephen. Each vial holds 10 vaccines. We are governed by delivery dates – often given at very short notice – 3-4 days usually – and then we have to start ringing hundreds of patients – hence why we are currently under a great deal of pressure – and are not able to offer a home visit for only 1 patient at a time as we have to utilise the whole vial.

Mass Vaccination Sites – Many patients have had letters to invite them to book an appointment at a mass site – i.e. Kendal Westmorland Shopping Centre. If patients can / wish to travel and use this option, all we ask is that they kindly let us know so we can offer their appointment at Kirkby Health Centre to someone else.

We cannot comment on how the mass sites operate their appointments or give advice on where patients should be vaccinated – the choice is there for the patients to make. The important thing is that everyone who wants one is offered a vaccine.

Unpaid carers – Unfortunately we still have no guidance for this group but will put something on our Facebook page and website as soon as we know anything. We think there will be a portal set up that the carer will need to register on.

At this time Vanuatu (together with eight to nine other countries in the world) are Covid-free as the government have made strict regulations to avoid Covid developing there.

The service, readings, hymns and music will be on screen, and various members of our community will be reading, led by Fran Parkinson. For the service we are all asked to bring a stone/pebble from the garden or road. The service will incorporate many photos of Vanuatu as well as the introduction and reading from two women on their committee.



When we are able to have this service in church/chapel we all have a booklet, together with an envelope in which to put and gift-aid our donation. The annual service is the WDP's only source of income which they use to donate to charities world-wide. This year we are asked to donate by:-



RESULTS


On 2nd February we sent out to all 330 recipients of the digital **Link** an invitation to tell us what you think of the magazine by taking part in a survey.

- Never




Well, OK. Those who never read the thing probably won't have taken part in the survey either! But it's good to see all those who answered that they "always" read it!

3. Who reads your copy, print or digital?


- Just me



this year is the year of the Ox. They have produced some lovely work and learnt how to write their names in Chinese.


Valentine Love Trail

COVID VACCINATIONS

We are delighted to say that we finished the first dose vaccinations for our patients who are over 65. Patients aged 16 to 64 are being called for vaccination at the moment. Second dose of Covid vaccines for patients who were vaccinated w/c 21st December will be on March 11th in Penrith. We will be writing to all with your allocated appointment time w/c 1st March.

Those vaccinated w/c 11th January 2021 will be vaccinated with their second dose w/c 22nd March. Those vaccinated w/c 18th January 2021 will receive their 2nd dose w/c 29th March 2021.

We are really keen to vaccinate everyone as quickly as possible. The number of vaccinations we can give has been limited by the amount of vaccine delivered so far. Most vaccine delivered so far has been the Pfizer vaccine which has difficult transport and storage needs. (It can only be moved 5 times from the factory in Europe and has to be stored at -70°) For this reason most people will be called to the central hub in Penrith to be vaccinated. We have small amounts of the Oxford vaccine which are being given to our housebound patients and those with severe allergies to medication so can't have the Pfizer vaccine. For the most up to date information follow the Eden Primary Care Network Facebook page as the situation changes quite quickly. Once again, thank you for all of your support.

APPOINTMENTS

Sadly it is not possible at the moment to book a face to face doctor's appointment at Orton surgery. The doctors and nurses are continuing to operate a "telephone first" system at Shap Medical Practice. It is also possible to have a video consultation if you wish.

If a face to face consultation is needed, it will be arranged for you on the same day at Shap surgery. Some telephone and video appointments can be pre-booked online, otherwise contact the surgery at 8.30am to arrange one. Surgery attendance for appointments will be kept to a minimum to reduce the risk of infection to our patients.

Please check the NHS 111 website if you are unwell with cough, fever or change in sense of smell or taste symptoms.

MEDICATION

Prescriptions will be available for collection from the Orton Village Hall between 10am and 11am on TUESDAYS. Any not collected will be returned to Shap.

If you are shielding or have difficulty collecting your prescriptions please let us know. We can arrange delivery or refer to the 'Good Sam' Service for help.





WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR CAN MAKE

On Friday 13th March last year I attended the AGM of C & W Wrestling Association and the following Friday we were due to have a committee meeting. That meeting never took place because it was during that week that we were "locked down" and this year's AGM will be, guess what, on ZOOM. When we attended last year's AGM I don't think that any of us had really taken on board just how serious the situation was going to become. The outcome obviously was that no competitions took place at all, a situation which I believe will only have occurred during wartime. ***The impact on all our lives, in many different ways has been immense and at the present time we cannot really be sure if or when things may return to "something like normal".***

Although not identical, wartime is probably the nearest comparison to what we have experienced

over the last year. I think that I can say without hesitation that for those of us who have experienced 2020, ***we will never forget it.*** We have definitely learnt a lot of new words and expressions, some people have been unable to work and some have sadly lost their jobs; and worse still a lot of people have lost their lives. We are very lucky to live in a rural area but even in this area we have had infections and sadly some deaths of people we have known. I am also sure that there have been many instances of people doing their best to help those in real need and ***putting real LOVE into action in their lives.***

I have been looking up some figures about the SPANISH Flu which began in February 1918 and ran until about April 1920; this is known as the most severe pandemic in modern times. It started before the end of WW1 and actually caused the death of more people than the war. Military and civilian deaths in the war were in the region of 20 million but deaths worldwide from the flu were in excess of 50 million and may have been as high as 100 million. Deaths in the UK from the Spanish flu were about 228,000. Thankfully now that we have the vaccines available the number of deaths in this pandemic from now on should begin to reduce.

Without any doubt, I am certain that we will all be giving thanks for the skill of our amazingly gifted scientists in producing the vaccines so quickly. If the vaccines were NOT available then the outlook at the present time would be very bleak indeed and there would certainly be ***"no light at the end of the tunnel".***

During this pandemic I am sure that we are all very thankful indeed for everyone who works in the NHS plus all the workers in the care homes. They must have all been under immense stress both physically and emotionally and very sadly some of them have lost their lives.

Tree Planting

It may be that on your daily walks around Orton, during the Covid lockdown, you have noticed tree cages appearing in the glebe field next to Becks Barn. It has taken a while but we have been able to get permission from the Carlisle Diocese to plant a few trees there, which we did before Christmas.



Historically the income from the glebe, in tenants' grazing fees etc., formed part of the Vicar's stipend. This is no longer the case, and the local glebe land now belongs solely to the Carlisle Diocese and is not in any way the responsibility or property of All Saints' Church – hence the reason for having to get permission for this project. We are restricted to ten cages in each field.

You will see that we have ten tree cages in the first glebe field, each of which has been planted with 3 – 5 saplings in the centre - this includes one forest tree such as lime, oak or sweet chestnut, with the remaining saplings being shrub or scrub species such as hawthorn, blackthorn, hazel, dogwood, and rowan. Born Jeanne Antoinette Poisson in 1721, the Marquise de Pompadour was a member of the French court, best known as Madame de Pompadour. She met King Louis XV at a masked ball at the Palace of Versailles and soon became his official mistress living in her own apartments in Versailles. She was a very beautiful and intelligent woman who set Paris styles for many years. Dolls were made wearing exact copies of her clothes and sent to England so that dressmakers could copy the French fashions. Pictures show that she was not only a beauty but had accomplishments – music, reading, letter writing, plays and novels. She was an adornment to the King's apartments.

6th February: Thanks for minding about us as friends and making us aware of confirmation of Covid vaccination. Otherwise the rumours are too much around us. But now we are affirm. If the program comes we shall be alert.

(From us: "Our vaccination in UK is free. If that is not so in Uganda I am sure we here would like to help. In UK some Cathedrals are being used for vaccination centres... Maybe you could offer All Saints!")

6th Feb: I would discuss it with the Municipal Mayor and Town Clerk.

9th Feb: My wife Melina Walina is sickly with flu and cough but she is at home on Medication for four days. We need your prayers. (Answer: "We will pray for her on Morning Prayer this morning.")

12th Feb: Thanks for your Tuesday morning prayers upon my wife Melina. Today she has prepared evening tea for me, though weak; we have trust she will be in health. Continue prayers.

12th Feb: We hold Couples Corner Zoom fellowship every Sunday at 8pm. We emphasize PEACE, RECONCILIATION, & NON VIOLENT in our families, regardless of faith, race, tribe, colour.

Secondly we are encouraging the Mothers' Union members and Youths to use their skills to earn a living. Tailoring and weaving sweaters, and baskets. We are trying to do something to sustain the people of God. Never cease to pray for us.



15th Feb: (Rev. Nelson's birthday and also their Church Gift Day, to which some Orton people made a contribution - the picture in next column shows our gift being handed over):







£250,000 Cathedral Grant





Reflections From Lockdown

During lockdowns this year I suspect many of us have used the time to do outstanding jobs and to sort out everything from clothes to boxes in the loft or garage.

During my latest burst of sorting I came across the transcripts for the two Millennium services which I did for Ravenstonedale Parish during the year 2000. The first was in March at St Oswald's, and the second in November at Newbiggin-on-Lune Methodist Chapel. They put me in mind of what the Church (Diocese) is trying to do today 20 years later.

Both the services were based on the premise of **God for All**, the ecumenical movement, and reaching out to all the community whether church-goers or not - something I feel this parish

has always been good at. The two services were totally different in approach, but both encompassed people and clergy from all our places of worship, people of all ages and beliefs and all walks of life - in short, the whole community. It was a time when the whole community came together to celebrate 2,000 years of Christianity.

Following on from this I was also reminded of just what a community can do when pulling together. It is amazing what we managed to achieve when we all worked together. Our newly formed Millennium Committee started with a public meeting at Newbiggin to get some ideas for how to commemorate the 2000th anniversary of the birth of Jesus. The commemorations involved many different groups and individuals who would not have known each other before, and who have remained friends ever since.

Along with all the usual street parties and different gatherings, some of the lasting achievements coming from that time were things such as:-

- The Millennium Tapestries which move around our villages annually.
- The Ravenstonedale Parish Map which is still used and valued by many.
- The Millennium Playing Field which is available for all to use for sports and recreational activities.
- Two Children's Playgrounds, one in each village.
- The Cycleway/Footpath re-joining the two villages together.

These things were not achieved overnight and required a lot of hard work, co-operation and fund-raising to bring them to fruition. It is a testament to the people of this parish that we managed to achieve so much in remembrance of the birth and legacy of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

During this last year of lockdowns and restrictions, our communities have once again come together to overcome adversity, and to support and help each other through prayer and zoom and acts of kindness, regardless of our beliefs or non-beliefs, or of who and what we are.

I grew up in a village environment where the Church and Chapel were the hub of the community, where we each supported each other's events, and where we joined together for services. Let us pray that we can continue to do that here in High Westmorland through the Mission Community.

Ravenstonedale's Local History Talk gathers

National Interest

Ravenstonedale Parish History Group (RPHG) continued its series of short talks based on the history of the pubs in the Village. ZOOM continued to be the medium to bring the audience to the meeting, including attendees from Cumbria and across the UK, welcoming participants from Wiltshire, Somerset, Surrey, London and very welcome guests from Kirkby Stephen Upper Eden History Society and the Westmorland Dales Landscape Partnership.

January's talk divided into two sections. Firstly a chronological history spanning from late 1700s to the present day of The Fat Lamb Inn, situated just outside Ravenstonedale village on the main road linking Kirkby Stephen and Sedbergh. The earliest records that identify what is today called the Fat Lamb Inn is a rental return dated 1779, referring to Cross Bank. Further evidence was taken from a research document published by Keith Lovet Watson ("The Hewetson Families of Ravenstonedale", 1991) and electoral returns which identified the owner and tenant in 1832.



Unlike the King's Head and Black Swan, the other two pubs in Ravenstonedale, the Fat Lamb had not always been a pub, as records confirm it was a farm (at least three times – 1856, 1911 and 1948), a café and grill and a petrol station. From being a farm in 1856, the property reverted to an Inn in 1862. The families who ran the Inn were traced from the late 1800s to the 1960s (Moore, Dickinson and Lisle). Participants in the ZOOM meeting recalled the Lisle family, as the proprietors of the petrol station.

Hewetsons as a family owned the property from 1856 to 1958. An anecdote, collected as an oral history by RPHG, reported the events in the winter of 1963, when 23 people were trapped in the pub by impassable snow drifts for 3 days, including the postman! The current owner, Paul Bonsall, bought the property in 1978. At the time it was the Cross Bank Café. Paul has since achieved his vision of creating a Hotel, Restaurant and Pub which is very popular with visitors to the area and notably classic car owners clubs.

The second section of the talk presented what is known about the lost pubs of Ravenstonedale parish. Drawn from oral histories, recollection and where possible substantiated by documented archive, the location and brief history of the Pig and Whistle (Newbiggin-on-Lune, also known as The Commercial), Rigg End (name of pub unknown – but proven by discovering a document from 1747), the Scotch Ale House at Smardale Bridge, The Pack Horse, Ravenstonedale and an ale house, name unknown, at Cold Keld.

Rigg End and Smardale Bridge would have been essential resting places (and refreshment opportunities) for pack horse hauliers, as both pubs were on the old road that crossed the fell, before the turnpike road was built and the old pack horse route fell into limited use. Today the route forms part of the Coast to Coast long- distance footpath.

The Pack Horse is largely recorded in anecdotal references, including the often cited Revd Nicholls publication from 1877 and its likely location was confirmed by piecing together circumstantial evidence taken from a sale prospectus source (a unique item in the RPHG local archive collection), a trade directory (1858) and various legal documents available on the Ravenstonedale Community website.



The ale house at Cold Keld was proven by an artefact discovered and restored by the owners of the property. The artefact is an ancient sign for an Ale and Porter House, with the inscription 'BE DRUNK ON THE PREMISES'! On closer inspection, the sign is damaged and would have said 'Ale and Porter, TO be drunk on the premises'!

Zoom talks will continue from Ravenstonedale Parish History Group. All welcome. “Labour of Love puts Parish on the Map”

This headline above an article and photograph in the Herald in August 2001 was inspired by the launch of the Ravenstonedale Parish Millennium Map and its Companion Book. The map also inspired February’s Zoom meeting of the Ravenstonedale Parish History Group. Once again, Zoom opened the attendance to members, guests and friends from locations across Cumbria and for the first time, guests from Scotland, the USA and New Zealand.

Jackie Wedd presented her talk, *The Parish Millennium Map – an Offcomer’s Appreciation*, encompassing an overview of the research she has compiled documenting the story of the development and publication of the map. The talk is a preview for a much anticipated “live” talk, which will be a more detailed presentation exploring some of the local oral histories, historical events and myths recorded on the Map which is a montage of line drawings with captions and snippets of information. Her second talk will also highlight the four Millennium Parish Embroideries, produced by 22 volunteers over two years.

Jackie’s interest in the Map project began when she and her husband saw the framed copies of the Map in the Black Swan in Ravenstonedale when first visiting the village in 2009. The map inspired them to return to the village the following year to visit some of the points of interest depicted. These included the oldest inhabited house, the old packhorse bridge with the beck disappearing beneath it and Bowberhead Farm, now confirmed in 2020 as the latest Cumbria Wildlife Trust Reserve which will protect and enhance the traditional haymeadows there.

The sites and stories to be illustrated on the map were identified by collecting ideas and recollections from the residents of the parish during 1998-99. Financial support was obtained from the National Lottery Millennium Festival Awards for All and other national and local sources. The project was co-ordinated by Richard Metcalfe-Gibson, and questionnaire packs were designed by Barbara Godden, the then headmistress at Ravenstonedale School, and sent out to every house in the parish. The late Chris Irwin and his wife Mary, proprietors of The Book House in Ravenstonedale, a local publisher of history books and an antiquarian book dealership, were recruited to design and publish the Companion Book to the Map which contains every contribution from the local residents. Meanwhile the team of three local professional artists, Caroline Metcalfe-Gibson, her husband David Morris and their good friend the late Tom Oldham began the lengthy process of designing and producing all the drawings for the two-sided Map, and Tom’s exquisite calligraphy related the information on it.

This development process is wonderfully illustrated in an exhibition of photographs of the drawings and lettering, as well as in the original questionnaires used in making the Map from March 2000 until it was finally sent off to the printers in 2001. The three artists contributed over 1000 hours of work between them. The record of the work involved is now held in the RPHG archives and will be exhibited again, as it was at the 2001 launch of the Map and Companion Book, when circumstances allow and hopefully to accompany Jackie’s second talk.

Historical scenes depicted include the detention prior to transportation of the accused sheep-stealer Mr Wharton, an event witnessed by a former resident of the Parish in around



1870 when she was a little girl. She told the story many years later in the 1930s to the late Helga Frankland who contributed it to the Map. The sentence of transportation for such crimes was within the remit of the Four-and-Twenty, the Grand Jury who presided over both trivial and

capital offences locally and who used to meet in the old Church before the gatherings were deemed to be too rowdy and they had to relocate to the nearby King’s Head.

More recent events depicted include the maiden flight of the British Airways Concorde hot air balloon in 1984 (a local man had won a ticket for this flight in a raffle in aid of Newbiggin



Public Hall funds) and the regular freezing over of Greenside Tarn in winters up to the 1980s, allowing games such as ice hockey to be played – although in a photograph from the Parish Archives dating from the early 1960s that Jackie was able to show the skaters looked much less confident! It was good to learn the name of one or two skaters in the photograph that the History Group have been unable to identify, contributed during the Zoom discussion after the talk by a member and former Ravenstonedale resident who now lives in Appleby.

Local flora and wildlife are celebrated on the map, including species very precious to the area such as Lapwings, Curlews and of course Red Squirrels. Other snippets included the recollections of the former railway line, the course of which is now partly followed by the A685, often mistaken for a Roman road there as it is so straight, although the regular bumps suggest the sleepers from the railway may still form part of the road’s foundations! The Ravenstonedale village pig house on the green is illustrated, where the parish pig was kept and fed by everyone who then took their share when it was slaughtered. The stone house, an ancient hillside structure on Ashfell, has a stone plaque inside with the names Milner and Knewstubb engraved on it. The Milner family commemorated there are the forebears of the New Zealander invited to the Zoom meeting, who by a strange coincidence now lives not far from the descendants of the Knewstubb man who carved the plaque. The mystery of the short-lived mansion with the odd name of Hwith, demolished a mere 60 years after it was built, will be revealed in Part 2 of the talk.

The Map proved a rich source of inspiration for local walks when Jackie and her husband Dave made repeated holiday visits to Ravenstonedale, which culminated in their move to the village as “offcomers”, hence the title of the talk. As noted, there will be an expanded “live” talk in the future, hopefully answering many questions that the Map inspires.

Why?



In January the 106 Bus Partnership launched a new bus timetable on Tuesdays and Fridays which opens up a multitude of new route options for days out around Cumbria. The most spectacular of these is a journey known as **The Lakeland Loop**.



This is a full day bus trip travelling through the iconic Lake District landscape with time to stop-off and enjoy attractions along the way. The journey begins at 9.30am in Tebay and can be joined at any stop along the 106 bus route north of Tebay. Alternatively it can start at Penrith as the return 106 bus from Kendal will bring you back to Penrith on its last run of the day.

The 106 Bus will take you to Penrith Bus Station where you have a 45minute layover before joining the X5 service to Keswick. Alternatively you can get off the 106 at Penrith Railway Station and grab an ice cream at McDonalds and take a saunter around Penrith Castle before joining the X5 back at the railway station for your onwards journey at 11.20 (giving 55 minutes layover). The X5 bus will take you along the A66, past the foothills of the iconic Saddleback Mountain and into Keswick with stunning views of Bassenthwaite and Derwentwater with the majestic Skiddaw and Grisedale Pike rising beyond.

The X5 service terminates at Keswick Bus Station which is outside Booths. There is a half-hour wait to join the 555 bus to Kendal, which gives you plenty of time to pick up a sandwich. Alternatively you can layover for an hour in Keswick and join the 555 bus an hour later. Both the X5 and 555 buses are

double-deckers so you can get up higher to enjoy the views; they are also furnished with very comfortable coach seats and USB charging points.

Your journey on the 555 gives you an hour to play with along the route to Kendal (unless you take that hour in Keswick). You can get off at any point along the route for an hour and join the later bus which arrives in Kendal at 15.02, giving you plenty of time to join the last 106 bus home from Kendal which leaves at 15.30. There are so many options it would be impossible to list in just one article, but you could choose to spend a hour at Castlerigg Stone Circle, Hayes Garden Centre in Ambleside, Lakeland Limited in Windermere, or have a walk around Grasmere village and pick up some gingerbread. This route leads you through globally celebrated landscape, most famously captured by William Wordsworth, indeed you may alight at Dove Cottage for an hour if you wish.

The full adult ticket price for the route is quite expensive at £30.30 but Pensioner's Bus Card holders travel free of charge. The operator will receive 58% of that ticket price back from the Local Authority. This means that taking The Lakeland Loop with your bus pass will provide £17.57 per person towards the cost of keeping these bus routes on the road. £6.96 will go directly to support the 106 bus route which is commissioned by a local charitable organisation, The 106 Bus Partnership.

The journey highlighted above was undertaken in February and timetables are subject to change so do check the bus timetables online before you travel or call Traveline on 0871 200 22 33 (charges apply) if you don't have access to the internet. It is worth noting that there are public toilets available at Penrith Bus Station, inside Booths in Keswick and at Westmorland Shopping Centre which is just behind the bus station in Kendal.


